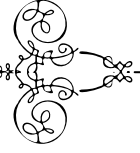
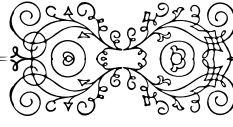
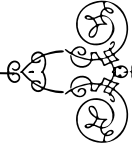


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Republic Day Address | January 26, 2024

Greetings to all on the 75th Republic day of Bharat. Only a few days ago, our nation witnessed a historic event – the grand opening of the Ram Mandir at Ayodhya by our Honorable Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi. This event brings back to focus the ideals that ‘Maryada Purushottam’ Shri Ram stood for. He led an exemplary life, performing all his duties, treading the path of Dharma.



On the Republic day which marks the momentous occasion when the Constitution of India came into effect in 1950, it is apt to reiterate that the original document of the Constitution has a beautiful sketch of Shri Ram at the beginning of the chapter related to Fundamental Rights. Shri Ram will indeed remain an iconic inspiration for generations to come.

In a couple of months from now, we as a nation will be participating and celebrating yet another significant event – the biggest festival of Democracy. Yes, the stage is almost set for a riveting electoral spectacle – The General Elections 2024. Having declared ourselves a democratic republic, the general elections conducted by the independent body – The Election Commission of India, provides the sacred opportunity to every Indian above the age of 18 to take part in the ‘Yajna’ of nation building.

Looking back to our civilizational heritage, democracy has a long and deep-rooted history in India. Yes, democratic principles are not new to the Indian Sub-Continent. In the ancient concept of democracy, the relationship between the ruler and the ruled has been considered similar to that of a father and progeny. The Rig Veda and Atharva Veda mention representative bodies like Sabha, Samiti and Sansad – terms still in use today. The Ramayana emphasizes governance for people’s welfare. The Mahabharata highlights Dharma speaks about ethics, morality and governance that are notable in Bhishma’s advice to Yudhishtira on the battlefield and the Bhagawad Gita, offers timeless guidance of duty.

Since Independence, with numerous amendments, the constitution of India has evolved to echo the will of the people, while embracing inclusivity in a three-tier system of Union, State and Local self-government. India has experienced 17 National Elections, 400 plus State Elections and over a million local self-government elections since Independence.



Having inherited such an inspirational democratic heritage, we need to understand that the General Elections are not a mere political fan-fare for the political parties to show case their money and muscle power.

The trend over last few decades seems to be that in the garb of an election manifesto, the political parties are keen to outsmart each other promising freebies, waivers, reservations, privileges and benefits to selective sections of society, thus playing divisive politics exploiting the differences that have been driven into our society by the colonial masters. Votes are sought largely on basis of caste & religion and the gullible voters fall into the well laid out trap.

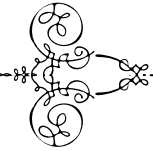
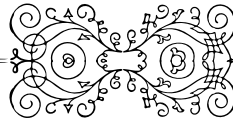
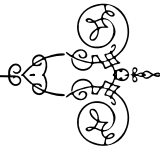




This is possible only when our youth equip themselves with the required skills which will eventually propel the nation towards our goal.

The world has become a global village. Hence, Linguistic skills can also facilitate your growth.



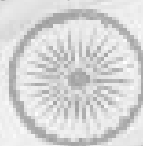

The **New Academic Year for 2024-25** began on March 20 for classes X and XII, June 6th for classes IX and XI, and June 10th for classes I to VIII.

ACADEMICS

An overall aggregate percentage of **85.89 %** was secured in the SSCE-2024, i.e, Class XII Board Exams. 90 out of 230 students secured **90%** and above. The highest aggregate in **science stream, 495/500** was secured by **Adarsh Chandramouli. Gowtham S** stood second with **493/500. Arjun Balaji** and **Srishanth S** secured **487/500** and stood third. Overall, there were **four centums in Computer Science, three in Chemistry, three in Engineering Graphics, two in Physics** and **One each in Maths, Biology and Psychology** respectively

He is currently pursuing MBBS at Madras Medical College. **S Gowtham** scored **99.90** percentile in JEE Mains and was ranked **1200 in JEE Advanced**. He has joined IIT Madras.

C Aditya Narayanan who scored an impressive **99.87** in JEE Mains with a rank of **1873 in JEE Advanced**, is pursuing his Under Graduation at IIT Madras. **Naresh Amitesh** who was the **top scorer in JEE Mains with 99.92** and secured the rank of **2331 in JEE Advanced** has also joined IIT Madras. 15 students of the **NEET batch** have secured above **500 out of 720**. **8** Students have secured admission in government medical colleges. All students of the NEET Integrated batch

have cleared NEET-2024, while in JEE Mains -**16** students have secured **above 95 percentile** and **6 students scored 99 percentile**, and in the highly competitive JEE Advanced 2023, **11** students have qualified for entry into IITs, while **6** students have joined IIT. **5** students have joined the NIT and BITS by virtue of their merit.

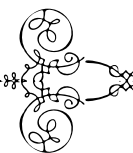
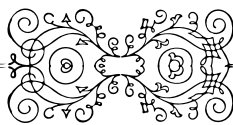
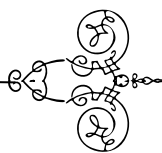

- **SHRI RAM** of class XI A and **SAI ROHITH** of class VIII E were selected for the District Basketball Team for the Under-16 Youth State Championship.




STAFF ACHIEVEMENTS

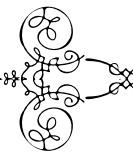
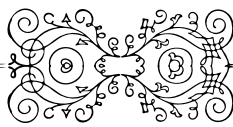
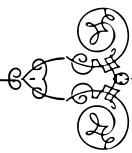
EVENTS

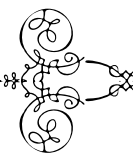
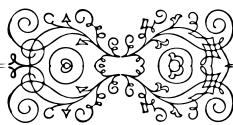
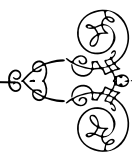
- **Varshaant**, an annual event was held on March 30th to evaluate the progress made on the commitments made at the beginning of the year during the Varsharambh Ceremony.

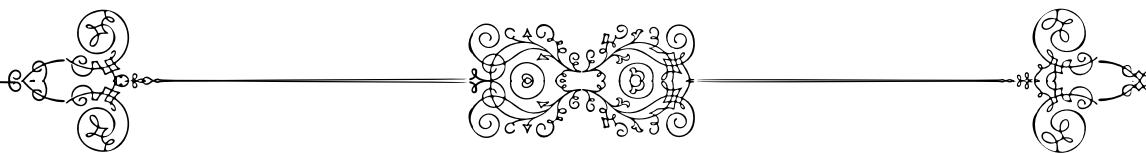

- **Serve others:**

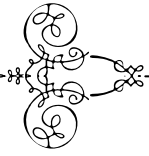
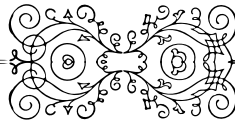
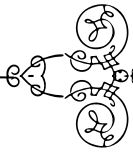

கூடாது", என்று தங்களுடைய குழந்தைகளைத் தடை செய்வதும் மிகுந்த வேதனைக்குரியது.

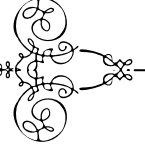
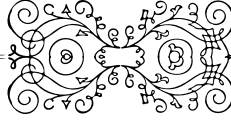
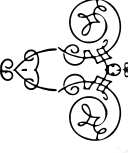

All this while the feline had stayed with the landlord, embracing him and absolutely forgetting its old master. Every time the man came about the mansion, the feline looked for opportunity .

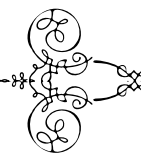
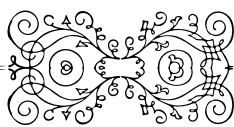
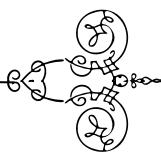

Our soul's own voice, lost forever.





The only thing about sadness that seems to be universally agreed upon is that it has been felt by most people throughout the time, and for thousands of years one of the best ways we have dealt with this difficult emotion is to articulate it, to try to express what feels inexpressible.

Hence, neurotechnology may elevate the computational ability of a living being but over-interference of it may affect emotions like empathy, which is crucial for humanity's existence, causing the human interaction experience to be less profound and more superficial - or, as one might aptly describe, 'robotic.'

The societal implications are further disturbing. Cognitive disparity may surpass all other types of inequalities if economic privilege acts as the ultimate arbiter of access to cognitive enhancement, as history suggests it will. It is one thing for education, often imperfectly distributed, to serve as a vehicle for social stratification; it is quite another for the very fabric of cognitive capability to become a marker of privilege.

The real question, then, is not whether humanity can embrace this technological revolution but whether it should. In our race to transcend natural limitations, we must confront what we are willing to sacrifice. The pursuit of cognitive enhancement is not just a scientific or technological endeavor; it is at moral and philosophical crossroads. The list of consequences described throughout this article contains only a few, but on a deeper thought one may easily figure out the advantages and disadvantages. The basic question that stands in front of us is that: Will this technology uplift humanity as a whole, or will it serve to destroy it from within or perhaps stay unrealized due to our inability to use it responsibly? The answer will not be determined by innovation alone, but by the values and principles that guide its implementation and it should not be considered as a decision to be taken by computer scientists or policymakers; it should be treated as a decision for humanity itself. The leap forward that neurotechnology offers is undeniable. But the question remains: Will it be a leap towards enlightenment or a descent into a more fragmented and controlled existence?




Science Club Report

The Science Club at D.A.V. Boys Senior Secondary School has embarked on an inspiring journey in the academic year 2024-2025, fostering a passion for science, innovation, and critical thinking among students. The club's inauguration, held in the primary auditorium, set an enthusiastic tone for the year with a captivating skit on the evolution of technology and Artificial Intelligence (AI). Since then, the club has organized several engaging activities, including a survey on Climate Change and Renewable Energy Sources for Classes IX and X, which received responses from about 153 students. Students from Class VII collected and classified everyday items like bangles made from various materials, stamps, and spices, enhancing their observational and critical thinking skills while promoting environmental awareness and sustainable practices. Additionally, students of Classes VI, VII & VIII participated in a Project-Based Learning activity, where they brainstormed and selected a topic, divided it into 5-6 subtopics, and created a questionnaire with an average of 50 questions. They surveyed 50 to 120 respondents, analyzing the data to create statistical representations. One of the teams from class VIII surveyed on “Waste Reduction & Recycling in Marina”, aligning with the club’s motive towards environmental awareness. A Journey Through Medicine and Memories





Dr. Praveen S is an alumnus of our school who is currently working as a House Surgeon in Rajiv Gandhi Government General Hospital. He did his MBBS degree from the famed Madras Medical College. He served as the Student Secretary of the Madras Medical Co-operative Society and the State President for the Students Network Organization of Tamil Nadu from 2022 to 2023. He is currently serving as the Co-Convenor of The Indian Medical Association Medical Students Network, Tamil Nadu from 2023 onwards.

It's 3.00 a.m. in the midnight at the Institute of Obstetrics and Gynecology (IOG) at Egmore , "tok tok tok" is the background noise from the Cardiotocography machine with its probe lying on a mother's stomach and as I think of stealing a 5 minute break, the mother on the board yells at the top of her voice "Doctor please do something, the pain is agonizing", the PG (Post-graduate) puts a Bishop Score and says "She is going to deliver in the next few minutes, be ready with Oxytocin and Lignocaine for the delivery" and in no time the head of the baby crowns and I deliver the baby - and once the baby is delivered the umbilical cord is cut when the umbilical artery pulsations subside and the placenta is delivered in less than a minute. The neonate is then handed over to the pediatrician for the routine care and we move on to the next delivery - this is how a typical night duty in a House Surgeon's life looks like - you will hardly have time to even stand as it is always a busy day in the IOG with an average of 10-15 deliveries in each shift with each shift lasting for 12 hours.

As we approach the crack of dawn, I run to collect the investigations and to check for vitals in the ward. My juniors arrive and after teaching them a few basics about the process of labor, I leave the IOG for my home and at the entrance adorns the bust of Dr. A.L Mudaliar who stands as a witness to all the hardworking PGs and House Surgeons. His famous adage rings in my ears - "Masterly inactivity and watchful expectancy".

Dr. A.L Mudaliar needs a mention at this point. Dr. Arcot Lakshmanaswami Mudaliar is a legend in his own right. The Obstetrics and Neonatology Block at IOG is named in his honor. It's been almost close to a century since he wrote the famed






"Mudaliar and Menon Clinical Obstetrics" but it still continues to be the gold standard textbook for obstetrics which stands as a testament to his clinical prowess.

After a 12 hour gruelling duty, as I take the Anna Salai enroute to my residence, I cross the American consulate - a place that I harbor several memories from my school days. I usually accompany my school friends to the bus stand that flanks the embassy where we have a bit of chit chat and now my mind steers rapidly towards the memories of my school days, Fast forward - "Om Bhur Bhuvah Svah" echoes all over in the corridors of DAV at 8:00am in the morning with the first lecture being Chemistry awaiting the attention of the class. I have to confide that I have always been an ardent student of Chemistry. Like the resonating structures of benzene dancing in the mind of Kekule, I found Chemistry beautiful, for which a lot of credit goes to my Chemistry teacher - Sampath sir. We step into an interesting discussion from the chapter of alcohols - what's the difference between Ethanol and Methanol? He threw a question to the class. Probably a methyl group? , or the ease with which one is available while the other isn't?, a bit of silence from the class ensues and he explains- "The one who drinks ethanol dances in ecstasy" and after a bit of pause he goes on "while someone else dances in ecstasy before the one who drinks methanol" - the class bursts into laughter, now how does this have any relevance to my practice of medicine - well methanol poisoning is quite common in rural parts of Tamil Nadu, The Institute of Forensic Medicine and Toxicology of the Madras Medical College being an apex Centre receives numerous cases of methanol poisoning in a year - I have had the opportunity to witness a few while I had been posted at forensic medicine electives.

Now Methanol has interesting properties - it's similar in odor to ethyl alcohol with the same intoxicating properties and it's rapidly absorbed in the intestine and accumulates in the blood, it undergoes oxidation in the liver to formaldehyde (which is 33 times more toxic than methyl alcohol) and then to formic acid (six times more toxic than methyl alcohol) - formic acid is responsible for metabolic acidosis (increased acid production in the body) and complete blindness due to its effect on the optic nerve, consuming even 50 ml of methyl alcohol can result in death in 24-36 hours , now whenever I see a case of methanol poisoning I cannot help but appreciate the ingenuity with which the difference was explained to us - One evokes a sense of instant melancholy while one evokes a sense of euphoria (not in the long term though), "Wow what wonders a single -CH₂- (methyl) is able to make!! " I exclaim to myself. In the month of May this year I had the opportunity to brief the students of class 10 and 12 of our school about the detrimental effects of drug addiction, in which methyl alcohol was also mentioned.

How can I forget the amount of effort that my teachers - Naina Baburaj ma'am and Shanthi Asokan ma'am have invested in raising our understanding of biology - the chapter DNA synthesis, replication and mutations were taught so well that it will






make a good lecture even for a first year medical student who is supposed to read it in Biochemistry. Biology was a cake walk for most of us as we never struggled with it, infact it was one class where we propitiously, never slept! I will go on to say that it was absolutely useful for my NEET - UG preparation where 50% of the total marks' rests with one's expertise in the two NCERT books of 11th and 12th biology. I eventually scored 605/720 being the 90th candidate in the state to step into the Madras Medical College

I hope the reader of this article remembers the word Cardiotocography that I had mentioned at the commencement of this article - the Cardiotocography is the graphical representation of the heart rate of the foetus that lies in the womb of the mother - the waveform is closely monitored to see if there is any fetal distress so the mother can be taken for a lower section Caesarean section immediately - now the catch is that the Cardiotocography machine measures the instantaneous heart rate of the foetus - the concept of instantaneous change comes in, well doesn't it sound very familiar to a student of mathematics and physics? - it's quite exactly the same - while some of my peers might find difficult to understand this concept, I found to a bit easier to grasp it as I had paid attention to the classes of my Maths and Physics teachers respectively - Smitha ma'am and Chitra ma'am. These were nailed into our memories as the foundation of Calculus lies in understanding this instantaneous change that occurs in events that happen around us.

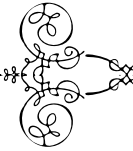
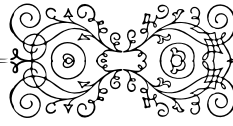
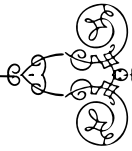
Our English teacher Mini James ma'am needs no introduction. The command which she had over the language (and over the class as well!) was unparalleled. She would explain each and every paragraph from the high school textbook - Flamingo with so much vigor and pomp that we would forget that we are seated in an English class. Rather it feels as though we are watching a drama - with all the characters running in front of us - the English class can be at best described as an experience rather than a mere 'class'.

The labs were a separate joy in itself - from making biology slides to understanding resonance to titrating potassium permanganate with Ferrous Ammonium Sulphate, and once the pale pink color appears - "You have done an excellent job Praveen Kumar" Sampath sir exclaims. The chemistry lab was the most favourite of mine as I had the opportunity to experiment with a lot of compounds that would indeed form my foundation for pharmacology. Here comes the most awaited evening - the 1 and 1/2 hour Physical Education period that we eagerly awaited for. We used to slog in the gigantic Gopalapuram ground for hours together under the sun playing basketball, cricket and what not! I also had the opportunity to represent my school team as the Team Captain in Inter-School Basketball Tournaments. Last but not the least I will never forget the window seat of my classroom with which I share fond memories.



The gift of education is not something that everyone is born with. The only difference between me and a boy of the same age group as mine who works in a restaurant as a waiter which I witness most often is this - the gift of education - education has the ability to give one independence and instills a sense of inquisition. It is an opportunity for one to break away from the clutches of poverty and move up the socio-economic ladder. With the advent of online application forms, I hope the students of this School wouldn't have had the opportunity to witness the queue that would extend from the School till the American Embassy for procuring the application form for our School, almost a kilometer in length! Such was the craze for this School, and it continues to be so.

What you have got is a huge opportunity to propel yourself and increase your standing among your peers. the 12 years of school education form the basis of your professional competence that you would exhibit years down the line. As opposed to what most think - school is definitely not gruelling. School is comfort. It is the only place in life where you are being paid to study, especially with our highly sophisticated school. It is a crude waste of time and money if you guys let go of this opportunity that is presented to you. As much as I would like to share more with you guys, I am bound to abide by the word limit and hopefully will be talking to you guys through another article of mine where I will be sharing my experiences in the internship that soon followed my UG course.





"It's not like I want to kill it! But sacrifices must be made for the greater good!"




"Oh, please. The greater good has nothing to do with this!"




“I think we need to let it go.”

Coming Full Circle: From Student to Mentor








An Evening in Marina




Life is a game; you play to win.





The War In Your Body: The Immune System And Its Defence

Have you ever cut your thumb before? Of course. Well, what happens when you do so? Your thumb might swell slightly and turn red before eventually healing. A simple, barely noticeable thing. Yet, every time this happens, a war rages on in your body, with cells fighting for days continuously, displaying fascinating defenses and unbelievable prowess. This is the immune system's war in your body. You see, every time you cut yourself, thousands of invaders enter your body. They have one purpose - to use your cells' resources for themselves. Thankfully, we have a sophisticated self-defence system which is activated once a cell is invaded. The cell releases signals to nearby cells and the body, alerting the immune system, which immediately leaps into action.





The immune system has a vast array of cells. One type is the macrophage cell, which is quite larger than your average RBC. The macrophages capture germs and ingest them, but unfortunately, they aren't always enough. So, they release chemical signals, calling for reinforcements.

The message is picked up by another type of cell in your blood - neutrophils. These release acid and kill bacteria near them. But, unlike macrophages, they do not know how to differentiate between friend and foe, and their acid can kill your own cells. This is why neutrophils die just sometime after birth. But while they're alive, they kill ruthlessly.

As the battle rages and intensifies, the rest of the body pipes in to help. The blood vessels release fluid into the place where the invaders come from (in this case, your thumb), causing inflammation. This is why your thumb swells up.

The body does this since the fluid contains one of the most potent and fascinating weapons your body has - complement proteins, which are like guided missiles that locate bacteria and kill them. One example is the C3b protein, which identifies the invader, and attaches itself to it. It then acts as a base for other complement proteins to land on, constantly changing shape, till the whole organism is swarming with complements, which then kill it. However, when even all these powerful warriors aren't enough, your body resorts to intelligence. Another type of cell, the dendritic cell, enters the battle almost unnoticed, finds an invader and kills it. But unlike the macrophage, which devours it, it takes part of the invader and uses the bacteria's DNA against it.

It travels through the body till it reaches the T-cells. The T-cells' function is unbelievable. There are billions of T-cells, and when each of them is born, the body allows them to slightly, randomly change their DNA structure.

Since there are so many, we end up with several combinations of gene codes. One of them will surely match the bacteria's DNA. That is the one the dendritic cell hopes to find. Once it does find it, it awakens the T-cell, which then travels through the body to yet another group of cells - B-cells.

Just like there was a T-cell with the perfect DNA for the germ, there is a B-cell with the perfect weapon against it - antibodies. When the needed B-cells arrive on the battlefield, they release thousands of deadly antibodies in a determined attempt to protect you.

Finally, the battle has been won, and the tiny cut on your thumb heals. All the cells we have seen in this article are our sophisticated natural defense. Yet today, we often use artificial resources like antibiotics far too frequently. They kill not only the invading bacteria but also the bacteria good for you. So rather than using antibiotics frequently, we must eat healthy, immunity-building foods to strengthen our body's natural defense - the immune system!





Myth Of California

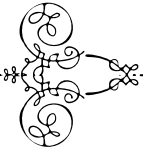
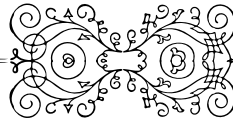
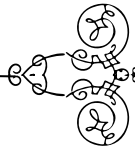

Passion: Losses and Gains





लियोनेल मेस्सी को सार्वकालिक महान फुटबॉल खिलाड़ियों में से एक माना जाता है। 1987 में अर्जेंटीना के रोसारियो में जन्मे मेस्सी ने छोटी आयु से ही अपार प्रतिभा दिखाई। वह 13 साल की उम्र में एफसी बार्सिलोना की युवा टीम में शामिल हुए और 17 साल की उम्र में पहली टीम में पदार्पण करने के लिए तेजी से आगे बढ़े। तब से, मेस्सी ने अपने शानदार करियर में कई प्रशंसाएँ और रिकॉर्ड हासिल किए हैं। मेस्सी की सबसे उल्लेखनीय उपलब्धियों में से एक उनके रिकॉर्ड तोड़ छह बैलन-डी-ओर पुरस्कार हैं, जो दुनिया के सर्वश्रेष्ठ खिलाड़ी को दिए जाते हैं। गेंद पर उनके अविश्वसनीय कौशल, दूरदर्शिता और गोल करने की क्षमता ने उनकी तुलना डिएगो माराडोना और पेले जैसे फुटबॉल के दिग्गजों से की है। कई रक्षकों को आसानी से छकाने और असंभव दिखने वाले कोण से गोल करने की मेस्सी की क्षमता ने उन्हें दुनिया भर में प्रशंसकों का पसंदीदा बना दिया है।



अपनी व्यक्तिगत सफलता के अलावा, मेस्सी ने अपने क्लब एफसी बार्सिलोना के साथ भी बड़ी सफलता हासिल की है। उन्होंने क्लब के साथ कई घरेलू लीग खिताब, चैंपियंस लीग खिताब और कोपा डेल रे खिताब जीते हैं। बार्सिलोना के साथी खिलाड़ी आंद्रेस इनिस्ता के साथ मेस्सी की साझेदारी ने पिछले कुछ वर्षों में क्लब की सफलता में महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका निभाई है। मैदान पर दोनों खिलाड़ियों के बीच टेलीपैथिक समझ है, वे अक्सर एक-दूसरे को गोल करने के लिए तैयार करते हैं और अपने साथियों के लिए स्कोरिंग के मौके बनाते हैं।

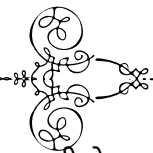
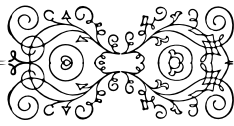
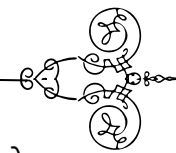


मनु का भ्रातृ-प्रेम
